March Newsletter & East Quarry

The March edition of the newsletter has been circulated parish-wide.

The article by the East Quarry campaign group has caused some controversy. Appley Bridge Community Association have been on the receiving end of a great deal of criticism from residents of Appley Bridge who have been asking them why they are not dealing with this. Many residents appear not to be aware that the role of a Community Association is to organise events of a social nature – not to get involved in lobbying. Some residents of Appley Bridge support the proposals for the quarry and wish this to be known. East Quarry issues will be on the agenda of the next Policy & General Purposes Committee meeting in April.

I have let the campaign group know the position with regard making a complaint to the Parliamentary Ombudsman. In their reply they have suggested that, perhaps when meetings are open again, they might be able to have a public meeting at which they could explain the position to the general public and clarify a few issues.

Shevington Fete 2021

The Fete Committee are excited to announce that they have set the date for Shevington Fete 2021 – it is Saturday, 7 August. Shevington 'War Zone'

There have been numerous reports recently (especially on Facebook) of the number of young adults congregating around the shops during the evenings. Earlier this month a resident wrote to say that he had walked through the Park, the Memorial Garden and the Recreation Ground that Sunday morning and had discovered a scene that looked like the morning after a pop concert. The volume of discarded cans/bottles/fast food trays etc spread over all the areas was breathtaking. He picked up all the litter (approx 5 -7 bags full) but he says:

"....this cannot be allowed to become a weekly occurrence as the summer approaches.

I would be most grateful if you would bring it to the attention of the Councillors during the next meeting so an action plan can be formed, whether that is greater Police intervention or provision of some private security patrols. Allowing this to continue without action now, will result in it becoming more difficult to control later on."

I have written to thank him for bringing this to our attention and for collecting the litter.
